All fourteen members of the Board of Supervisors answered roll call.

The Employee of the Year 2012 Award was presented to Robert Stuck, Senior Building Maintenance Mechanic.

John Dendis, resident, Town of Junius voiced his concern that most of the parking spaces in the south parking lot at the County Building are reserved for E911 staff; when they should be reserved for senior citizens.

Brian Preston, resident, Town of Waterloo, expressed his concern about the IDA and its accountability and transparency to the public. He would like to see from the IDA quarterly / annual reports on all business conducted by the IDA.

1 Approval of Board Meeting Minutes

2 The meeting minutes for the March 12, 2013 board meeting were approved.

3 Reports of Standing Committees

4 Human Services Committee, Mr. Davidson, Chairman. The Committee recommended a board
5 resolution for the following: (1) the reappointment of Dr. Joseph Marinelli to the Finger Lakes Workforce
6 Investment Board as a representative of the public sector. The term limit is July 1, 2013 through June 30,
7 2015; (2) the approval of the 2012-2016 (January 1, 2012 – December 31, 2016) Annual Plan for the
8 Child and Family Services as required by the New York State Office of Children and Family Services.
9 The Plan covers the Strategic Component, Administrative Component – Local Department of Social
10 Services, Administrative Component Youth Bureau and the PINS Diversion Services –Strategic
11 Component. The Committee approved extending the position of Temporary Social Welfare Examiner
12 until October 18 because of prolonged medical leaves of other staff; and approved filling two positions
13 for Summer Youth Counselor.

14 Public Works Committee, Mr. Kaiser, Chairman. The Committee recommended a board
15 resolution for the following: (1) accept a grant from the Genesee Transportation Council for \$3,600 for
16 the purpose of a study to evaluate the proper locations where safe passing should be permitted on county
17 roads, appropriate a local match of \$4,100 (\$1,000 in-kind, \$3,100 cash) at the time of application and
18 authorize proposal solicitations from qualified firms to assist the county in the study. A safe passing zone
19 study has not been done in Seneca County since the late 1960s - early 1970s; (2) authorizing additional
20 services for Colonel’s Row Sewer Improvement Project by MRB for \$8,570; (3) the purchase of a skid
21 steer loader with accessories to be shared between Sewer District 2 and Water District 1. The equipment
22 will be purchased under NYS Contract bid pricing; (4) bid solicitation for improvements at the Willard
23 Wastewater Treatment Facility and acceptance of a grant. NYSEG awarded a grant in the amount of
24 \$47,000 to support the replacement of existing blowers and the addition of Variable Frequency Drives
25 (VFD), thereby reducing future energy consumption.

26 In other matters, the Committee learned from Roy Gates, Highway Superintendent, who said bids
27 for road striping will be sent out in the next couple of weeks. Each year we do one half of the county
28 (North & South). Mr. Gates also reported that the opinion of the county attorney is that the Seneca
29 County Highway Department can join other counties that are going out for bids for vehicles. This would

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1 save Seneca County from going out on separate bids and advertising. If a vehicle is purchased, the
2 purchase will still need to be authorized by a board resolution.

3 The Committee discussed the merits of having a customer service shut-off policy for Water
4 District 1. The County Manager was directed to draft a policy for the committee to review.

5 Finance, Assessment & Insurance Committee, Mr. Prouty, Chairman. The Committee
6 recommended a board resolution (1) authorizing the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors to sign
7 agreements to extend the tax rolls and bills to the villages of Interlaken, Ovid, Lodi, and Waterloo; and
8 2) to sign agreements to provide tax extract files to the school districts for 2013.

9 Planning, Development, Agriculture & Tourism Committee, Mr. Earle, Chairman. The
10 Committee recommended a board resolution (1) appointing Michael Scaglione to the Seneca County
11 Planning Board. Mr. Scaglione serves as the Vice President of the Five Star Bank in the Geneva Branch;
12 and (2) authorizing the solicitation of Requests for Qualifications for an Engineering Firm that meets
13 Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Requirements for the Finger Lakes Regional Airport

14 Government Operations Committee, Mr. Westfall, Chairman. The Committee recommended a
15 board resolution to declare property surplus for auction from Highway, Weights & Measures, and
16 Emergency Management.

17 Technology Committee, Mr. Churchill, Chairman. The Committee approved the creating a
18 position for a PC and Network Support Specialist Position for the LEC. The position would be Grade 8.
19 Salary = \$38,000 plus benefits. Sheriff's budget has funds to cover 6-months of salary for 2013 (approx.
20 \$25 - \$26 thousand). For 2014, the salary would be included in IT budget (this year IT does not have
21 enough funding). The staff that serviced the LEC retired in 2009. The position was never refilled.
22 Sheriff's Office has 98 separate computers and 38 separate programs. The amount of work and
23 maintenance would justify a full-time position.

24 MUNIS update: We are now in Phase II - Payroll. They are currently building the master file,
25 inputting data conversion, etc.

26 Public Health Services Committee, Mr. Earle, Chairman. The Public Health Committee approved
27 and recommended a board resolution (1) authorizing the solicitation of bids for the Annual Household
28 Hazardous Waste Collection Event. Medications are not included in the Public Health HHWD because
29 the Sheriff's office collects them; (2) authorizing the application for state assistance for Household
30 Hazardous Waste collection and for the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors to sign a contract with
31 DEC for reimbursement. They will reimburse the municipality up to 50% of the costs associated with the
32 event; (3) authorizing a provider agreement with New York State Department of Health for
33 reimbursement for Early Intervention services. NYS will be taking over the administration for the Early
34 Intervention program. Part of the process is of the local public health department to contract with NYS

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1 DOH as a provider. This is an attempt to alleviate the County of some of the burden of providing
2 services; (4) authorizing the renewal of the transportation contract for the Early Intervention and
3 Preschool programs and for the Chairman of the Board to sign the agreement. The provider is Durham
4 School Services, Syracuse, New York (formerly A&E Transportation Services, Canandaigua, New York);
5 (5) authorizing the Chairman of the Board to sign an agreement; and authorize the County Treasurer to
6 establish the escrow account; and authorize bi-monthly deposits into the account for payment of EI
7 claims. Commencing April 1, 2013, the New York State Department of Health will be contracting with a
8 fiscal agent to assume responsibility for the fiscal management and payment of early intervention claims.
9 The County needs to establish an escrow account and deposit sufficient funds to cover the expenses for
10 the Early Intervention Program on a bi-monthly basis. The first deposit (approximately \$12,000) must be
11 made by April 15, 2013. The Board of Supervisors would need to authorize the Chairman of the Board to
12 sign the agreement; and authorize the County Treasurer to establish the escrow account; and authorize bi-
13 monthly deposits into the account for payment of EI claims.

14 Public Safety Committee, Mr. Reynolds, Chairman. The Committee approved and recommended
15 a board resolution authorizing (1) the refill of two positions in the Probation Department. One of the
16 Senior Probation Officers is retiring. This position would be filled internally, leaving a Probation Officer
17 position vacant; (2) authorizing the Chairman of the Board to sign an agreement to receive funding for
18 grant FFY 2010 (\$17,271) and authorize the Director of Emergency Management to apply for the grant
19 for FFY 2012 (\$17,877); (3) authorizing Seneca County Sheriff to purchase 37 still cameras to be
20 installed in the County Correctional Facility. We need to be in compliant with the Federal Prison Rape
21 Elimination Act of 2003 since we house federal inmates. The cameras and equipment, and software will
22 be provided by Black Creek Integrated Systems Corp, as a sole source vendor and county maintenance
23 staff will provide and install wire, cable, conductors, and conduit and standard black boxes as needed.

24 Indian Affairs Committee, Mr. Shipley, Chairman. Russ Wheeler, member of Citizens Advisory
25 Committee, reported on the Citizens Equal Rights Alliance National Conference. He said that CERA
26 representatives did research at the National Archives and four the list of Indian tribes that was included in
27 the Indian Reorganization Act. The list did not include any tribe from New York.

29 Chairman Hayssen appointed Supervisor Stephen Churchill to the county courthouse renovation
30 project steering committee to fill a vacancy created when the County Engineer position was vacated.
31 The committee received a proposal from Finger Lakes Technologies Group related to relocating the 911
32 backup center to a renovated igloo at the former Seneca Army Depot.
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1 County Manager Remarks

2 County Manager Rowe said that White Deer, Inc. donated an original photograph of a white deer
3 from the former Seneca Army Depot. The picture hangs on the third floor next to the south-east entrance
4 of the Board of Supervisors meeting room.

16 time PC & Network Support Specialist position at their committee meeting on March 26, 2013; and

17 WHEREAS, funding for this position is available by amending the 2013 Seneca County Budget

9 be used to do the installation of associated work for the project; and

32 **FULLY FUND ANY INCREASED COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH EARLY VOTING**

33 RESOLUTION NO. 68-13 moved by Mr. Shipley, second by Mr. Kubasik and adopted by 682 ayes and
34 68 nays (Churchill).

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1 WHEREAS, A.689 (Silver) / S.1461 (Stewart-Cousins) has been introduced in the New York
2 State Legislature establishing early voting in primary, general and special elections in the State of New
3 York; and

4 WHEREAS, this bill would allow early voting to take place up to 14 days before a general
5 election and up to a week before a primary or special election, from 8:00 am until 7:00 pm on every early
6 voting day including Saturday and Sunday; and

7 WHEREAS, county boards of elections would be required to select a minimum of five polling
8 places throughout each county and provide election inspectors at each location; and

9 WHEREAS, county boards of elections would also be required to follow the same polling place
10 protocols that are observed on election day on all early voting days; and

11 WHEREAS, there will be costs associated with staffing early voting locations, and printing and
12 county paper ballots associated with early voting; and

13 WHEREAS, the 2 percent tax cap and insufficient relief from state-imposed mandates has placed
14 an unprecedented strain on local governments to provide more services with less funding; now therefore
15 be it

16 RESOLVED, that the Seneca County Board of Supervisors does hereby oppose the passage of
17 legislation requiring counties to implement early voting and be it further

18 RESOLVED, if the proposal is enacted, allow counties to opt-in to providing early voting
19 opportunities and the State needs to fully fund the cost of early voting for those counties that provide
20 early voting; and be it further

21 RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution be sent to Governor Andrew M. Cuomo, Senator
22 Michael F. Nozzolio; Assembly Minority Leader, Brian M. Kolb, and Assemblyman Philip A.
23 Palmesano.

24 Mr. Churchill recognized the Seneca Lake Pure Water Association on receiving the U.S. EPA
25 Environmental Quality Award for 2013. This is the highest recognition presented to the public by the
26 EPA.

27 Mrs. Garlick Lorenzetti said there will be a Finger Lakes Landfill Summit at Hobart and William

30 Vitale, Director of the Bureau of Permitting and Planning in the Division of Materials Management for
31 the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. County Manager Mitch Rowe will also
32 be a guest speaker at the summit representing Seneca County.
